Fridays, Salutations to the Theotokos: an inspiration for us to pray fervently to the Mother of God as we simultaneously prepare for the Annunciation.

**Saturdays, Great Vespers:** an evening prayer service which offers stillness in anticipation of the Divine Liturgy to receive Holy Communion.

Additionally, the Church also invites us to make a commitment in our personal lives.

**Prayer:** when we wake up, before we go to bed, before we eat, and throughout our day.

**Fasting:** to create a discipline of fasting from specific foods not simply in the form of a diet, but as an acknowledgement of our willingness to sacrifice for our Lord.

**Almsgiving:** to give generously to those in need through various acts of kindness.

Great Lent can be overwhelming, but living and experiencing the cross must be a part of our Christian existence. We can truly witness Christ's love and mercy when we trust and rely on Him in our lives. This Lenten season offers us the opportunity to grow in faith and show that we are committed followers to our Lord Jesus Christ.






#### Did you know...Philoptochos History

In July 1974 Turkey invaded Cyprus and 250,000 refugees fled their homes. Philoptochos across the U.S. went into action and sent aid to Cyprus in the form of food, clothing, blankets, and medical supplies. Many more activities were undertaken including a Foster Parent program for the displaced children of Cyprus.

Philoptochos established St. Photios Shrine as a national commitment. The shrine had been established in 1965 and was dedicated to the first Greek settlers who arrived in the New World. The shrine is in St. Augustine, FL. Every year our chapter sends a donation for the national commitment to the St. Photios shrine.

## JUNIOR DIVISION (GRADES 7-9)

TOPIC 1: His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch
Bartholomew has earned the title of the Green
Patriarch, and was named one of Time Magazine's
100 Most Influential People in the World for His
teachings about humanity's spiritual responsibility
for taking care of God's creation — planet earth. His
All-Holiness stands on the shoulders of Saints, who
taught that the world is a gift from God, and that
taking care of His creation is a way to connect with
God. Explore and discuss the teachings of His
All-Holiness and the Saints on the creation
of the world. What are some of our
practical responsibilities as stewards of
our planet, and how does that enrich

TOPIC 2: Many of us have heroes to whom we look up. It may be an older brother or sister, an athlete, or a musician. We have heroes in our religious life, as well as people who inspire us to practice our faith. They teach us, usually by example, how we ought to live as Orthodox Christians. Select a Saint or person who has been the most influential in your spiritual life. Describe the particular and practical ways that influence has taken place.

our lives as Christians?

**TOPIC 3:** On the Day of Theophany (January 6), we chant, "All those who were baptized in Christ have put on Christ" (Gal. 3:27). Discuss the meaning of this hymn and the obligations it places upon us as Orthodox Christians.

**TOPIC 4:** When reading the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15: 11-32), we learn about the various stages of repentance. What are they? How do they relate to the reversal of the son's journey away from the father? What does the father's reaction upon seeing his son teach us about our relationship to our Father in Heaven?

**TOPIC 5:** The Orthodox Church has a rich heritage of sacred hymns that "contribute radiant and poetic splendor to Orthodox worship," thus opening the way to God. Select your favorite Church hymn and talk about how it strengthens your faith.

## SENIOR DIVISION (GRADES 10-12)

**TOPIC 1:** Slandered without cause, convicted without a trial, exiled unjustly — this was the life endured by one of the greatest saints of our times — Saint Nektarios of Aegina. Forgiving others who hurt us that deeply and unjustly seems almost impossible. What can we learn from Saint Nektarios, whose life was about forgiving what some might call the impossible?

Man, and Christ as the second Adam. The Fathers of the Church, especially Saint Irenaeus of Lyon, refer to Christ and Panagia as the second Adam and the second Eve. Why is the Most Holy Theotokos called the "Second Eve?" And why is Christ called the "Second Adam?" How do Christ and Panagia fulfill and go beyond their prototypes?

TOPIC 3: Christ says, "This is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me" (Luke 22:1). He also says, "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in you" (John 6:53). Explore the Orthodox teaching on the Eucharist by reading the prayers of the Divine Liturgy, the writings of one or more Church Fathers.

**TOPIC 4**: The number of natural disasters worldwide continues to increase, resulting in more communities destroyed and more lives lost. How would you respond to someone who questions why God allows natural disasters to happen when we know God can intervene at any moment? If God is all-knowing, all-powerful, and all-loving, how can He allow evil things to happen?

**TOPIC 5:** During the Divine Liturgy, before the Consecration of the Holy Gifts, we hear the priest say the following: "Your own of Your own we offer to You, in all and for all." What does this petition mean to you as an Orthodox Christian? Why is it important for us to focus on giving back out of the gifts we have been given by God?

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#### DANCE TO LIFE, THEME OF THE 1987 & 2024 FOLK DANCE FESTIVALS






The Minoans participated in their first Greek Orthodox "Dance to Life" Folk Dance Festival (FDF) in 1987, held in Anaheim. Ten dancers, six parents and two directors from Nativity participated,

wearing homemade team shirts. Now, 37 years later, a new generation of Minoans returned to Anaheim, for another "Dance to Life" FDF with five performing groups, over 50 performers, five directors, an amazing parent support crew and six musicians from Greece.

The weekend kicked off on Thursday with a service project organized by the Metropolis of San Francisco

Philoptochos to build bikes for the Boys & Girls Clubs of America. Our young performers worked hard to build their bikes and won an award for their Kefi. Opening Ceremonies and Agiasmos blessing were led by His Eminence Archbishop Elpidophoros and clergy that evening.

Dance and choral performances were held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Three competing Minoans dance groups presented dance sets from Crete and Thrace, accompanied by musicians from

## How to donate to the Nativity of Christ from your IRA if you are over 72

Using a **Qualified Charitable Distribution** (QCD) is a great way for folks over 72 with an IRA who need to withdraw funds to meet a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) to contribute to Nativity's Beyond 50 campaign or Stewardship fund. The money you contribute to Nativity using a QCD is not included in your adjusted gross income on your tax return, which is a better option than listing the donation as a simple charitable contribution. According to the IRS:


A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is generally a nontaxable distribution made directly by the trustee of your IRA (other than a SEP or SIMPLE IRA) to an organization eligible to receive tax deductible contributions. You must be at least age 72, when the distribution was made. Also, you must have the same type of acknowledgment of your contribution that you would need to claim a deduction for charitable contribution.

## A Lasting Gift for the Church – (Planned Giving)

A bequest or gift through your will is one of the simplest ways to make a lasting gift to the Church. Please consult your financial advisor for advice. A suggested wording: *I hereby bequeath the sum of* \$\_\_\_\_\_ as a charitable bequest to the Nativity of Christ Greek Orthodox Church of Novato (Tax ID23-7122395) to be used for charitable purposes of the Church.
