



"And the Word became flesh & dwelt among us, full of grace & truth." ~John 1:14



One large group stopped attending church without initially intending to do so. Some moved to a new city with the intention of finding a church but never took that next step into a faith community. Many young professionals prioritized personal networks around their careers and, as a result, found themselves disconnected from a local church. Some families prioritized children's sports and other activities that increasingly happen on Sundays. Then there are those who stopped attending church during COVID-19. They developed new Sunday rhythms and now prefer those new activities over Sunday morning.

The Church's task, then, is not to simply integrate itself with modern American life, marketing itself as one lifestyle choice among many. Nor is it to retreat from the world. The Church's call is to repair the remains of modern life. The U.S. is aching for a different way of life. Only the Church can offer that alternative. The Church must engage in a grand political project. She must reform a people accustomed to consumption. The Church must see itself as the source and center of cultural renewal. She must take responsibility for resolving the atomization we all experience because no one else will. Consequently, the Church should think of cultural engagement less through cognitive, propositional, and "winsome" terms, and more towards an approach that prioritizes making Church essential to communal life. The Church that hosts community fairs and car shows is doing cultural repair. The Church that models strong, healthy families, which encourage women to pour into each other, for men to sharpen one another, and for both to have more children than they can afford is waging a culture war. The Church that has



its families cheerfully open their homes cultivates commitment to one another through thick and thin is conducting a cultural insurgency.

Don't start with a big program. Don't suddenly think you can add to your church budget and begin. Start personally and start in your home. I dare you. I dare you in the name of Jesus Christ. Do what I am going to suggest. Begin by opening your home for the community.

The Church the U.S. needs is the Church willing to take Schaeffer's dare. It's the Church that sees, in all the division, an alienated people starving for a center to life. It's the Church that opens its doors and says, "we don't have much, but if you let us, we want to walk with you." It's the Church that is willing to do the hard, messy work of real love. Ultimately, it's the Church that takes seriously Jesus' words, "By this, all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:35)"



# James the Apostle, brother of Our Lord

According to some, this Saint was a son of Joseph the Betrothed, born of the wife that the latter had before he was betrothed to the Ever-virgin. Hence he was the brother of the Lord, Who was also thought to be the son of Joseph (Matt. 13: 55). But some say that he was a nephew of Joseph, and the son of his brother Cleopas, who was also called Alphaeus and Mary his wife, who was the first cousin of the Theotokos. But even according to this genealogy, he was still called, according to the idiom of the Scriptures, the Lord's brother because of their kinship.

This Iakovos is called the Less (Mark 15:40) by the Evangelists to distinguish him from Iakovos, the son of Zebedee, who was called the Great. He became the first Bishop of Jerusalem, elevated to this episcopal rank by the Apostles, according to Eusebius (Eccl. Hist., Book II: 23), and was called Obliah, that is, the Just, because of his great holiness and righteousness. Having ascended the crest of the




Temple on the day of the Passover at the prompting of all, he bore testimony from there concerning his belief in Jesus, and he proclaimed with a great voice that Jesus sits at the right hand of the great power of God and shall come again upon the clouds of heaven. On hearing this testimony, many of those present cried, "Hosanna to the Son of David." But the Scribes and Pharisees cried, "So, even the just one hath been led astray," and at the command of Ananias the high priest, the Apostle was cast down headlong from thence, then was stoned, and while he prayed for his slayers, his head was crushed by the wooden club wielded by a certain scribe. The first of the Catholic (General) Epistles written to the Jews in the Diaspora who believed in Christ was written by this Iakovos.

### 2023 Stewardship

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"And some fell into good soil and grew, and yielded a hundredfold" (Luke 8:8)

We are a seed and our Church is our soil. A seed contains a miracle. When you look at it from the outside, or touch it, it appears hard, dry, perhaps even dead and incapable of producing anything. But place it in the ground, give it water and warmth, and life begins to stir. The outer shell dies but the inner kernel comes alive by the mysterious forces of growth. The inner powers of the kernel are released when the seed is in proper soil and receives adequate moisture. The kernel germinates and new life begins. As long as nourishment is provided, growth continues. From the seed comes a flower, a plant, or a tree, each of which was present only potentially in the seed.

Is the miracle of growth manifest in human beings, too? Yes, by all means. Not only our physical being but also our spiritual being has the potential of miraculous growth. Physical growth is practically spontaneous and automatic. Yet physical growth, too, requires adequate nourishment and suitable environment. Spiritual growth is neither spontaneous nor automatic. Spiritual growth requires the exercise of personal freedom through intellectual, moral and spiritual decisions, commitments and actions. But spiritual growth, too, surely needs a proper environment and constant nourishment to flourish.

In the Parable of the Sower (Luke 8:5-15), Jesus teaches that both seed and soil are necessary for growth. Both seed and soil need proper interaction to produce satisfying crop. The seed is likened to the word of God. The soil is the life and heart of each human being. The parable tells us that much seed is lost when falling into unreceptive soil. However, when seed and soil connect and interact properly, astonishing growth occurs. "And some fell into good soil and grew, and yielded a hundredfold."

May our Church continue to help us flourish and grow both physically and spiritually.

City of Novato Approves Architectural Plans!

On Wednesday, September 6, 2023, the Novato had all five of its Design Review Committee members present and unanimously approved the architectural design submitted by Nativity of Christ. A condition of this approval is that the landscape plan and site lighting plan will be brought back to the Design Review Committee for final approval.

We thank Christ Kamages and John Hunter for representing our Parish at these series of meetings and all the work they and CJK Studios continue to offer as we strive to make these exciting dreams a reality.

So, what's next?

These plans will now go to the Novato Planning Commission, and then finally to the City Council. Once approved by the City Council, Nativity will be able to submit its final plans for building permits.

As this process continues, it is our desire to receive final feedback from all of you! To that end, we will be holding two parish-wide Design Review Workshops in the month of October. The first on Sunday, October 8, following the Divine Liturgy (to

be held in person) and the second on Thursday, October 12 (via Zoom).

At each Workshop, members of the Beyond 50 Committee will be offering updates on our progress with the City of Novato, our projected total timeline, and presenting current designs on our large capital projects for parishioner feedback. After completion

of the Workshops, our final step will be approval of the final plans. This approval will not be at our Fall Parish Assembly as previously communicated but will take place once plans have been finalized.

With Parish support, we can submit our final plans for building permits, which will then allow us to more actively pursue contractors to receive bids and have a concrete understanding of pricing for fundraising purposes.

We look forward to hearing from our community at these Workshops so we can continue to pursue an exciting vision for the future of our Parish to connect, engage, and grow!

#### How to donate to the Nativity of Christ from your IRA if you are over 72

Using a **Qualified Charitable Distribution** (QCD) is a great way for folks over 72 with an IRA who need to withdraw funds to meet a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) to contribute to Nativity's Beyond 50 campaign or Stewardship fund. The money you contribute to Nativity using a QCD is not included in your adjusted gross income on your tax return, which is a better option than listing the donation as a simple charitable contribution. According to the IRS:

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is generally a nontaxable distribution made directly by the trustee of your IRA (other than a SEP or SIMPLE IRA) to an organization eligible to receive tax deductible contributions. You must be at least age 72, when the distribution was made. Also, you must have the same type of acknowledgment of your contribution that you would need to claim a deduction for charitable contribution.

#### <u>A Lasting Gift for the Church – (Planned Giving)</u>

A bequest or gift through your will is one of the simplest ways to make a lasting gift to the Church. Please consult your financial advisor for advice. A suggested wording: *I hereby bequeath the sum of* \$\_\_\_\_\_ *as a charitable bequest to the Nativity of Christ Greek Orthodox Church of Novato (Tax ID23-7122395) to be used for charitable purposes of the Church.*
